HISTORY OF THE KIRKIN' OF THE TARTANS

The KIRKIN' OF THE TARTANS is an American tradition which celebrates the Scottish heritage of the Presbyterian Church.

The Protestant Movement began in 1517 after Reverend Martin Luther nailed the 95 Theses to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenburg. The first Reformation of the Protestant church followed the leadership of John Calvin in Switzerland in the sixteenth century. Known as the Reformed Church, it recognized the need for lay leadership. As a result, respected and wise laymen in the community were called to serve as church leaders known as "Elders" or "Presbyters" (from the Greek, *presbuteros*).

Meanwhile, John Knox from Scotland journeyed to Switzerland to work and study with Calvin. Upon his return to Scotland he named the church in Scotland "Presbyterian". Hence, the Presbyterian Church is Protestant (Luther), Reformed (Calvin) with Scottish refinement (Knox). Presbyterianism from Scotland and the Anglican tradition (Church of England) from England were the predominant religions in the New World during the establishment of the United States.

As a tribute to this heritage, Reverend Peter Marshall, Pastor of the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church in Washington, DC, and Chaplain of the United States Senate held the first service known as the KIRKIN' OF THE TARTANS in 1941. "Kirk" is a Gaelic term for "church". The KIRKIN' OF THE TARTANS, therefore, can loosely be translated as a blessing for those things Scottish and specifically, the tartan plaids and bagpipes which are the symbols most associated with Scotland. Tartans are plaid textiles of Scottish origin patterned to represent different clans, families or individuals. The tartan of Patrick Hamilton, the first Protestant martyr who was burned at the stake in 1528, has been frequently unofficially adopted for use in some Kirkin' ceremonies.

The KIRKIN' OF THE TARTANS worship service, therefore, asks the Blessing of God upon the Presbyterian Church. It is a service of rededication to the heritage and historical faith of the Church in God.

NOTES ON TODAY'S SERVICE

Today we celebrate the Scottish Presbyterian heritage through the *Kirkin' of the Tartans*. This is also the day we are celebrating "All Saints Sunday" when we remember the faithfully departed, as well as living saints. Much of the music for the service today comes from, or is in some way related, to the Reformation and Celtic tradition.

Long before Isaac Watts began to Christianize the Psalms, Martin Luther had already done so when he created the text and tune for today's Hymn of Praise, "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God", his most famous hymn, based on Psalm 46. We sing it today in honor of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation.

The hymn, "For All the Saints", was written by William Walsham How, for All Saints' Day in 1864. It is a commentary on the phrase "I believe in the communion of saints" from the Apostle's Creed. The great English composer, Ralph Vaughan Williams, composed the tune, SINE NOMINE. The name SINE NOMINE means "without name."

According to our *Glory to God* Hymnal, "the text for the hymn, *Come Sing, O Church, in Joy!*, was the winner in a hymn competition sponsored by the Presbyterian Church USA Bicentennial Committee for the 1988-89 observance, which had the theme "Celebrate the Journey." The late 18th century tune (first used with Psalm 148) is appropriately celebratory.

The Affirmation of Faith is taken from *The Scots Confession of 1560*, which was the first Reformed confession in the English language. John Knox and five other colleagues created the confession of faith at the request of the Scottish Parliament to be a confession of faith for the church and the nation of Scotland.

We thank the *Wolf River Pipes and Drums* for providing the thrilling music today! The bagpipe is now regarded as the national instrument of Scotland.

Elder James Harris is the Beadle for the service today. The Beadle was an historic lay office that was established during the Reformation. The Beadle served as a guardian of the church, especially for the protection of the "Kirk's" most treasured possession: the Bible. The Bible used in the service today is the Geneva Bible, affectionately referred to as the "Breeches" Bible. This Bible is the Bible that crossed the Atlantic with the Puritans and is also referred to by some as the "Puritan Bible".

THE BANNERS DISPLAYED IN WORSHIP TODAY were designed and constructed by members of the Liturgical Arts Committee for use at our first *Kirkin' of the Tartans* service in 2002. As you face the communion table, the banner to the right includes themes of the *Kirkin' of the Tartans*: the shield with the cross of St. Andrew (Patron Saint of Scotland), the Scottish lion, thistle flowers (traditional flower of Scotland), and flames representing the Holy Spirit. The banner to the left of the communion table includes themes of

the Reformation: three central figures representing the great Reformers (Luther, Calvin and Knox), the cross (primary Christian symbol), the Bible (representing the foundation of our faith and beliefs as Christians, as well as the Protestant watchwords "grace alone, faith alone, Scripture alone"), a stained glass window (a familiar element in many churches), and gold stars that represent saints of the church.

As we celebrate the blessing of our church and families today, you will notice *for the seventh year* – T-pole banners designed and made by Ms. Martha Chism of Ms. Em's Custom Draperies. We would like to sincerely thank her for her beautiful work which will be a tradition in our church for many years to come.

IN OBSERVANCE OF ALL SAINTS DAY, we invite your special prayers for those in our church family who have lost loved ones since last All Saints' Day. The flowers today are given to the glory of God and to honor the memory of those saints of the Church who have moved on to that "eternal house in heaven, not built by human hands." (2 Cor. 5:1) In our congregation, those who have died are: *Charles H. Huffman, Brian Curtis Cox, Paula Jones Mathews, Gertie Sue Rea Carruth.*

The "ancient" Hamilton plaid is draped with the flowers in recognition of Patrick Hamilton (1503-1528). Hamilton was a Scottish churchman and early Protestant Reformer in Scotland. He was martyred in St. Andrews in 1528.
